



# Loom Knit

*loom knitting redefined!*

*Brief introduction to the pattern*

## **PATTERN INFORMATION**

**Knitting Loom:** Knitting loom in X gauge. Sample was knit using X loom.

**Yarn:** X yds of insert weight of yarn and yarn content (Example: 100 yds of worsted weight merino wool). Sample used X yarn by X manufacturer in X color.

**Notions:** knitting tool, tapestry needle, insert any other notion needed (cable needle, row counter, etc).

**Other:** Any other special items needed for the pattern, such as buttons, ribbons, etc.

**Gauge:** Insert gauge—measure a 4 inch square and calculate the number of rows per inch and the number of stitches per inch. Write it as follows: X sts x Y rows= 2 inches where X is the number of stitches and Y is the number of rows.

**Abbreviations:** use a commonly known list of abbreviations. Please do not make up your own abbreviations, this makes it very difficult to keep a consistent list of abbreviations and it confuses the customer. If stitch doesn't exist in loom knitting, follow the same abbreviation as in needle knitting. Example:

K: knit stitch

P: purl stitch

**Pattern notes:** insert any special notes that belong to this type of pattern. Examples- use two strands as one. Pattern is worked flat/round.



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## INSTRUCTIONS

Tips:

### Knit vs Work

When writing the instructions, abstain from writing “knit 10 rows in knit stitch”, instead write it as follows “work 10 rows in knit stitch”. The process of loom knitting is knitting, however when writing instructions do not write “knit 10 rows in knit/purl stitch” as this is a bit confusing. Instead of using the word “knit” use the word “work”.

### Keep it short, concise and to the point.

Have you ever looked at a needle knit pattern? Rarely do they have more than a couple of pages. See if you can shorten a few sentences of instructions. Example: Row 1: knit 2 pegs, purl 2 pegs, knit 3 pegs, purl 1, knit 2 pegs, purl 2 **pegs, knit** 3 pegs, purl 1... The set of instructions can easily be shortened to “k2, p2, k3, p1; rep from \* to the end.
